



BAHAMAS MARINE FORECAST

MARINE FORECASTS FOR THE BAHAMAS ISSUED BY THE BAHAMAS DEPARTMENT OF METEOROLOGY AT 06:00 P.M. EDT, TUESDAY, 16TH SEPTEMBER 2025, FOR THE NEXT 24 HOURS. THE NEXT SCHEDULED FORECASTS WILL BE ISSUED AT 06:00 A.M. EDT TOMORROW.

The **threat** of strong to possibly severe thunderstorms **nudge up** for the second half of the work week for all waters (tonight until Friday night). These storms have the potential to produce damaging winds, heavy downpours, low visibility, frequent lightning, choppy seas, and possibly waterspout activity. Mariners/boaters are urged to remain vigilant and prepare

to seek shelter/safe harbour immediately.

There is a **high** risk of rip currents for all Atlantic-exposed coastal waters and a **moderate** risk of rip currents for east-facing coastal waters not directly exposed to the Atlantic; therefore, beachgoers and sea bathers are urged to exercise **extreme caution**. Rip

currents are dangerous and can sweep away strong swimmers.

Mariners and boaters are urged to exercise caution in Atlantic-exposed waters due to swell. A slow, northward lifting frontal boundary near the Northwest-Central Bahamas, along with increasing warm, deep tropical moisture and the support of a mid-to-upper-level trough, sets

increasing warm, deep tropical moisture and the support of a mid-to-upper-level trough, sets up an environment ripe for numerous showers and thunderstorms beginning tonight until Saturday. Meanwhile, Atlantic ridging across the islands supports a moderate breeze across the northern half of the country and a moderate to sometimes fresh breeze across the

southern half of the country.

NORTHERN BAHAMAS

(INCLUDING GRAND BAHAMA, ABACO, BIMINI & ADJACENT WATERS):

ADVISORY: During thunderstorms or heavy showers, gusty winds, higher seas, and reduced visibility are likely Easterly, 10 knots or less tonight through Wednesday afternoon; northeast to east, 10 to 15 knots

Wednesday evening but gusty at times, especially in the Northwest Providence Channel.

LOCAL SEAS: 2 feet or less in near-shore sheltered waters, 2 to 4 feet in offshore sheltered waters, and 3 to 5 feet

in Atlantic exposed waters

GULF STREAM: 3 to 5 feet

NORTHWEST BAHAMAS

(INCLUDING NEW PROVIDENCE, ANDROS, THE BERRY ISLANDS, ELEUTHERA & ADJACENT WATERS):

ADVISORY: During thunderstorms or heavy showers, gusty winds, higher seas, and reduced visibility are likely Easterly, 10 to 15 knots, becoming gusty Wednesday evening and night, especially in the Northwest

WINDS: Providence Channel and the northern Great Bahama Bank.

SEAS: 2 feet or less in near-shore sheltered waters, 2 to 4 feet in offshore sheltered waters, and 3 to 5 feet

in Atlantic exposed waters

SWELLS: Light north to northeast swell, mainly in Atlantic-exposed waters

PRECIPITATION: There is a medium-to-high chance (50%-70%) of widely scattered showers and isolated

thunderstorms in all waters.

CENTRAL BAHAMAS

$(INCLUDING\ EXUMA,\ CAT\ ISLAND,\ LONG\ ISLAND,\ SAN\ SALVADOR,\ RUM\ CAY\ \&\ ADJACENT\ WATERS):$

ADVISORY: During thunderstorms or heavy showers, gusty winds, higher seas, and reduced visibility are likely

WINDS: Easterly, 10 to 15 knots, increasing to 15 knots at night and rather gusty in all waters

1 to 3 feet in the near-shore sheltered waters, 3 to 5 feet in offshore sheltered waters and Atlantic

LOCAL SEAS:

1 to 3 feet in the hear-shore sheltered waters, 3 to 3 feet in offshore sheltered waters at exposed waters.

SWELLS: Light north to northeast swell, mainly in Atlantic-exposed waters

WEATHER: There is a medium chance (40%-50%) of widely scattered showers and isolated thunderstorms in

all waters.

SOUTHEAST BAHAMAS

$(INCLUDING\ INAGUA, ACKLINS, CROOKED\ ISLAND, MAYAGUANA, RAGGED\ ISLAND\ \&\ ADJACENT\ WATERS):$

ADVISORY: A small craft caution is in effect. During thunderstorms or heavy showers, gusty winds, higher

seas, and reduced visibility are likely.

WINDS: Easterly, 15 to 20 knots tonight; easterly, 15 knots Wednesday, increasing to 15 to 20 knots at night

and gusty at times in all waters

LOCAL SEAS: 2 to 3 feet in the near-shore sheltered waters and 3 to 5 feet in offshore sheltered waters, and 4 to 6

feet in Atlantic-exposed waters.

SWELLS: Light north to northeast swell, mainly in Atlantic-exposed waters

WEATHER: There is a low-to-medium chance (30%-40%) of widely scattered showers and isolated

thunderstorms in all waters.

TROPICAL WEATHER OUTLOOK:

The North Atlantic hurricane season runs from **01 June to 30 November**. Most of the activity tends to occur between **mid-August and mid-October**. Early preparation is key!

A broad area of low pressure located in the central tropical North Atlantic continues to become better organized. As the system moves west-northwestward (WNW) or northwest (NW) over the next several days, it is expected to encounter a favourable environment, and a tropical depression/storm is likely to form by the end of the work week.

There is a **high** chance (~90%) of formation through **two (2) days** and a **high** chance (~90%) of formation through **seven** (7) days.

Disorganized showers and thunderstorms in the far eastern tropical North Atlantic are associated with a tropical wave that has emerged from the west coast of Africa. This system has a **low** chance (~20%) of formation through seven (7) days as it moves westward.

Elsewhere, tropical cyclone formation is <u>NOT</u> expected during the next seven (7) days.

EXTENDED FORECAST FOR THE BAHAMAS FOR THURSDAY, 18TH SEPTEMBER 2025:

A small craft caution is in effect for the Atlantic-exposed waters in the Central and Southeast

ADVISORY: Bahamas. Gusty winds, higher seas, and reduced visibility are likely near or in thunderstorms or

heavy showers.

WINDS: Northern and Northwest Bahamas: Easterly, 10 to 15 knots.

Central and Southeast Bahamas: Easterly, 15 knots but gusty at times in the Atlantic waters.

Northern and Northwest: 2 feet or less in near-shore sheltered waters, 2 to 4 feet in offshore

sheltered waters, and 3 to 5 feet in Atlantic exposed waters

SEAS: Central and Southeast Bahamas: 2 to 3 feet in the near-shore sheltered waters, 3 to 5 feet in

offshore sheltered waters and 4 to 6 feet in Atlantic exposed waters.

Gulf Stream: 2 to 3 feet

SWELLS: Light northeast to east swell, mainly in Atlantic-exposed waters

There is a high chance (70%-80%) of numerous showers and scattered thunderstorms in the

PRECIPITATION: Northwest, and Central Bahamas and a low-to-medium chance (30%-40%) of widely

scattered showers and isolated thunderstorms in the Southeast Bahamas.

EXTENDED FORECAST FOR THE BAHAMAS FOR FRIDAY, 19TH SEPTEMBER 2025:

A small craft caution continues for the Atlantic-exposed waters in the Central and Southeast ADVISORY:

Bahamas. During thunderstorms or heavy showers, gusty winds, higher seas, and reduced

visibility are likely.

Northern Bahamas: Easterly, 10 to 15 knots.

WINDS: Northwest Bahamas: East-northeast (ENE) to east-southeast (ESE), 10 to 15 knots

Central Bahamas: East to southeast, 10 to 15 knots, falling light and variable at times

Southeast Bahamas: Easterly, 10 to 15 knots, but gusty in Atlantic waters

Northern and Northwest: 2 feet or less in near-shore sheltered waters, 2 to 4 feet in offshore

sheltered waters, and 3 to 5 feet in Atlantic exposed waters

SEAS: Central and Southeast Bahamas: 2 to 3 feet in the near-shore sheltered waters, 3 to 5 feet in

offshore sheltered waters and 4 to 6 feet in Atlantic exposed waters.

Gulf Stream: 2 to 3 feet

SWELLS: Light northeast to east swell, mainly in Atlantic-exposed waters
